Visit to South Slave School Division

The Northland School Division (NSD61) Board is encouraged that the jurisdiction is on the right path when it comes to improving literacy division-wide. This, after Donna Barrett, Superintendent of Schools, Gail Sajo, Literacy Supervisor and Delores Pruden, Director of First Nations, Métis and Inuit Education, made a presentation to the Board about their recent learning experience in the Northwest Territories. The trio, accompanied by Dr. Leroy Sloan, Consultant, and Shelly Hamelin, Hillview School Principal, visited seven schools in Hay River, Fort Resolution and Fort Smith to observe literacy practices.

Since implementing a literacy initiative eight years ago, South Slave has increased student literacy by enacting evaluations so teachers can track student learning and create focused lesson plans. They provide support for teachers, through literacy coaches in every school. Their initiative has resulted in higher achievement for students, recognition from government and by in from parents. The literacy initiatives in NSD61 and South Slave share many similarities. Barrett says even though it was helpful to see resemblance of NSD61's work somewhere else, it was also important to leave with fresh ideas.





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"After observing literacy practices in South Slave, we believe more training is needed to support principals and teachers," said Barrett. "We need to continue to enhance resources for schools, celebrate success and provide clear expectations."

Even though there is room for improvement, Barrett adds that schools across Northland School Division are demonstrating measurable growth in the number of students reading at grade level. Between September 2013 and June 2014, 15 percent more students in grades 1-3 are reading at grade level, 13 percent in grades 4-6 and 11 percent in grades 7-12. She suggests that NSD61 should continue to stay the course when it comes to literacy and look at strategies to increase support for schools.

Attendance Improvement Initiative - 'Every Day Counts' Implementation Plan Update



Don Tessier, Associate Superintendent of Schools presented an Attendance Improvement Initiative – 'Every Day Counts' planning document to the Northland Board. The planning document provides timelines and phases focussing on community engagement in school communities, establishing a process for monitoring student attendance with the intention of understanding where pressure points exist and specific dates for schools to report targets and strategies to central office staff. The document has been updated and will be presented to the Board at the March 27-28, 2015 Board Meeting.
